Two of our Core Values at UBC are
Transforming Communities and Sacrificial
Generosity. In just about every Focus Book
you'll find stories where these values are
illustrated, sometimes in quite extravagant
ways, and this edition is certainly no
different. As we drew near to publication
time, I was reminded by some of our staff
of how the sacrificial generosity of our
membership in maintaining and developing
our campus and facilities creates constant
opportunities for our community to find
their way to our door and spend time here
in our house of worship.

- Every year that I've been at UBC, and several years before me, the local chapter of Bible Study Fellowship (BSF) for women has met here weekly during the school year.
- Every major election sees the UBC chapel transform into a polling location, as numerous residents in our immediate vicinity come here to volunteer and to vote.
- Multiple fitness and running groups meet at UBC, some weekly and some daily.
- The Bay Area Music Teachers' Association has held events here as recently as this past semester.
- CCISD and individual schools in our district have used UBC facilities for PTA gatherings, teachers' meetings, and music events, including a joint choir of 500 high school boys, along with their fathers and grandfathers (see picture below).

- Our local AME (African Methodist Episcopal) church held their Women of the Gospel conference here this past semester.
- Our local Boy Scout and Sea Scout troops meet at UBC throughout the year.
- Every Friday during the school year a local home school co-op uses our building for joint educational opportunities.

All of these ministries take place completely apart from our church's calendar, staff, advertising, and communication efforts. They are independent, external community ministries, organizations, and programs that come to us for space to meet, sing, learn, grow, and celebrate. And most of these things happen without many in our church family even knowing about it!

Throughout the years, the members of our church have made our campus and facilities a priority of ministry, not only for our own immediate church family but also for our community. And the Lord has been, and continues to be, faithful in opening doors for us to connect with our neighbors and play numerous roles in Transforming our Community here in the Bay Area, thanks in large part to the ongoing sacrificial generosity of UBC members like yourself. This book is your book. It is your family at work. It is full of your stories; your testimonies; your Kingdom work.

We want to share life together and connect with each other, and our Family Picnics help us do those things. Watch for more picnics in 2019 and be sure to invite a friend.







Serving Ministries

Veteran's Day

A mobile 9-hole mini-golf course was also onsite to add to the festivities. Thank you to all who participated in this event that brought together Mercy Tree clients, veterans, and others from the community to appreciate and honor the sacrifices of our armed forces.







Spanish Ministry

One of our church goals for "Becoming Family" in 2019 is to expand UBC's outreach with a Spanish-language ministry. For two years, we have had a Spanish-language Weekend Bible Study (WBS) group named "Vastago de Gracia" [aka "Shoot" or "Stem" of Grace], and they are a fantastic group of people. They are involved in our Children's and Student Ministries, they lead a Bible study on Wednesday evenings, and they have participated in many of our serving trips, including ones in Los Angeles, in the Rio Grand Valley on Spring Break, and in the Dominican Republic. They interrelate to each other as a family, and the larger UBC community has already benefited from their positive outlook and ministry focus.

The Executive Committee approved the part-time hire of Freddy Coronado to help develop the group into a larger ministry of UBC. Freddy and his wife, Sharon, are a dynamic duo and they have

been meeting and working alongside the UBC pastoral team to get this important ministry launched. Vastago de Gracia meets for Bible study in the Chapel during the 9:30 hour on Sundays and they join the 11 o'clock worship service, where translation/interpretation is provided through wireless earpieces.

Starting in January, the gathering at 9:30 hour will include worship in Spanish. All UBCers are invited to attend Vastago de Gracia on Sunday mornings. It might be a good place for many of us to practice our Spanish-language skills! You can also connect with the Spanish-language ministry though Facebook by Liking their page, UBC en Español.

Driving With Care Hangs Up Its Keys

One of the best serving ministries of UBC is hanging up its keys after 16 years. Driving With Care was a ministry that gave people rides to and from their hospital appointments. In these latter years, the ministry was focused primarily on helping cancer patients access their treatments.



"There are so many people without any connections in the community," says Pat Garrett, the 15-year veteran leader of the ministry. "People are adrift," she says, "or they have loved ones who can't take off work to drive them every day for 6 weeks to their chemotherapy sessions." Transportation is one of those huge needs that people aren't aware of unless they know someone who is in need of ongoing medical treatment.



Over the years, Driving With Care had personal contact with over 1,200 people in the community, the vast majority being otherwise not associated with UBC. It was a real ministry of presence. The time spent in transit to the medical center provided many opportunities to discuss the difficult physical, mental, and often spiritual dilemmas that people were going through as they faced their mortality. "People would talk to us [volunteer drivers] about death and pain and things they couldn't talk to their loved ones about," says Pat.

As relationships with the patients developed, and as needs were apparent, many of the volunteers found their compassion pushing them into broader service to these individuals. This included admitting someone to the hospital who had become too sick during treatment to be driven home. It also, unfortunately, included making funeral arrangements for people who didn't have others in their life who could do so. It even included taking people to the airport who wanted to visit relatives in their home country before they passed away. Of course, there were plenty of opportunities to celebrate recovery and remission with newfound friends as well!

Driving With Care volunteers have been the presence of Christ to others "in the valley" of their lives. A combination of factors led them to officially close down the ministry this fall. Traffic congestion and age of many of the volunteers is a primary factor making the downtown drives to the Medical Center a bigger challenge. On the positive side of the equation is the introduction of "newer" treatment hospitals that have popped up in SE Houston in the past years making treatment more accessible for local folks. In addition to that, the advent of Uber and other relatively convenient transportation services have given patients a few more options that they didn't have when Driving With Care started up in 2002.





Space Weekend

Space Weekend 2018 included 90 international students, volunteers, and staff from 11 different countries! They came from University of Texas-Dallas, Southern Methodist University, and Richland College to Houston and stayed with host homes throughout the weekend. Students toured NASA and heard astronaut Bob Hines share his education, career, and faith. On Sunday, the group came to UBC to attend morning services, Bible study, and eat lunch at the Pavilion. It was a fun weekend and a great outreach!

5 Love Languages

This fall, Faith@Home launched a 6-week campaign focusing on *The Five Love Languages*. The goal was to help our church family learn how to express love to their loved ones in a way that fills their "Love Tank." Through the campaign, people learned that their love language may be as different from their loved one's as French is from English; each person has a primary way of expressing and receiving love. Knowing someone's primary love language is like knowing their favorite foods. Just because someone really enjoys pasta doesn't mean they never enjoy burgers. The fact that a spouse or child most benefits from quality time does not mean you should avoid words of affirmation. On the contrary, we show love in all five ways even while becoming particularly intentional about a loved one's primary love language. When we show others love in the primary love language, it is as if we are filling their love tank, Like putting gas in a car, each time you speak to them in their language you make a deposit in their love tank that gives them emotional fuel for the day.

During the campaign, many weekend Bible classes used one of the 5 Love Languages books by Gary Chapman. These small groups had great discussions not only on how to love each other better, but also how God demonstrates to us that he loves us through all of the different love languages! Not only were the participants in the small groups able to learn how to love each other deeply, in many cases the whole family was learning about the 5 Love Languages and great conversation happened around Sunday lunch tables---families having conversations about how to love each other better.

The Porch was the hub for the 5 Love Languages (5LL). Groups could take a selfie at The Porch as well as collect 5LL bracelets. Fridge magnets were available so people could personalize their loved one's love language to help remember what love language to speak to these special people. And to further help people keep track of what love languages others spoke, wallet cards were available for everyone to allow them to carry around a reminder of what love languages to speak to their loved ones.

The goal of this campaign was based on 1 Peter 4:8: Love each other deeply.



Our first fall forum featured Tony Davila, Director of Parent Assistance for CCISD. He shared tips with parents about how to handle behaviors in children of ALL ages! His focus included:

- Correcting fluently
- How to teach and model wanted behaviors
- Teaching kids how to set appropriate boundaries using assertive language and tone

There are times in our lives that we seem to hit a brick wall. In October, Charny Beck, MEd, LMSW from STCH Ministries, led a session on burnout! She addressed the fact that many people find themselves in a place where they are emotionally and physically exhausted with family, work, and life! During the presentation, she talked about the unavoidable truths regarding leadership and burnout, nine markers of burnout, and how we find hope as we travel the road back from burnout to be a blessing again. Charny did a great job helping people recognize what it looks like so that we can be aware and find resources to help recover from burnout.

"Teens and Technology. OH, MY!"




Women's Ministries

Winners received gift cards to Kroger to help buy Thanksgiving dinner (or anything else they worked out with their adult family members).








Preschool Praise Kids Christmas Concert

Twenty preschoolers, ages 3 and 4, joined our fall semester of Praise Kids choir. Every Sunday evening, songs were learned, and sweet little voices raised to our Lord while bells jingled and sticks kept rhythm. Leaders Kim Dischler, Leslie Rucker and Michelle Tressler, eagerly prepared the children for the December 2 Christmas concert.

The History of the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols

The story of the Festival of Lessons and Carols is one which transcends time and distance. UBC is thousands of miles away from King's College, Cambridge England, where this service was created in 1918, and where it has been performed for the past 100 years.

The original service was created by the new Dean of King's College, Eric Milner-White, who was trying to create an innovative, imaginative style of worship. After a slight rearrangement in the order of the nine lessons, the scriptures and the prayers have remained unchanged. The music has expanded as new carols and anthems have been written, providing a constantly renewed vitality with each Christmas Season. Almost immediately, other churches began using the format of the nine lessons and carols in their own Christmas services. The BBC broadcasts the service live from King's every Christmas

Eve.


FCA: Be an Example

UBC Foundation Reports

FINANCIALS

2018 was a great year for the Foundation! It could not have been so successful for God's Kingdom without the generous support of UBC members in donating, serving and participating in the events listed in this report.

The 2018 changes in the stock market affected our giving budget for 2019. The Foundation will still be able to give the scholarships and fund ministries. Our expectation is that these gifts will be in the range of \$20,000. This is a perfect example of why the Foundation needs to build its cash base through donor giving in addition to event income. Starting a planned giving program will assist us in building the endowment principal to continue giving despite market downturns.

Currently, the Foundation gives 70% of all unspecified income (from investments and event proceeds) to scholarships and ministries, and 30% is reinvested back into the endowment to increase the principal.

A donor may direct their gift to a specific fund, such as:

- Timothy Fund
- Bob Wall Fund
- · Jerry and Carol O'Neal Fund
- General Fund

For example, a gift that is directed to support the Jerry and Carol O'Neal Fund for student scholarships, 100% of the gift will be applied for scholarships. With this being said, it is important to note the Jerry and Carol O'Neal Scholarship Fund has been depleted. Specific donations are welcome to support this scholarship in the future. The UBC Foundation does have funds, apart from the O'Neal Fund, to continue to give student scholarships for the future.

Despite the downturn, the UBC Foundation can report:

\$16,000 to student scholarships for high school seniors and two seminary students;

\$16,300 to support various UBC ministries;

\$21,000 raised by the Golf Tournament, a record amount netted:

\$2,805 raised in the Spring and Fall Dine-Out-to-Donate events;

\$276,192 endowment held by the Foundation as of 1/01/19.
